WAR DEPARTMENT, Washington.

Statement by the Secretary of War.
The Cavalry, engineers, coast artillery, signal corps and quartermasters corps of the regular army have already been brought to war strength. 45,000 recruits are needed at once to complete the new regiments of Infantry and field artillery. 25,000 additional recruits are desired at the earliest practicable date to fill vacancies in order that the war strength of 300,000 men may be maintained. Facilities are in readiness for placing these 70,000 men under proper training. Any delay in obtaining this number will necessarily cause the loss of invaluable time. It is the earnest desire of the War Department that 70,000 single men between the ages of 18 and 40, who have no dependants and who are not engaged in professions, businesses, or trades vitally necessary to the prosecution of the war, be enlisted in the regular army before the 30th of June, 1917.

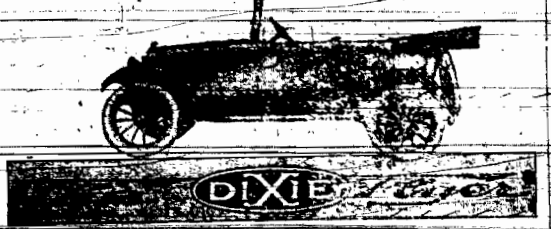

NEW TARIFF ANGLES

Discussion That Is Not Inappropriate Just Now.

Failure of the Underwood Law to Produce Needed Revenue Leads to Question of Needed Legislation After the War.

We have had the tariff with us so long, have revised it so often, have fought so many battles over it, a strong popular case exists for tariff discussion. Even in the midst of the war talk a few observations about protection and free trade will come in appropriately and very well.

For several years we have been operating under the Underwood law. When it was constructed there was no thought of a foreign war. It was calculated for peace. Its framers took into consideration peace conditions, both at home and abroad, and held the hope that they would long continue.

But even in those circumstances the calculations failed. The law did not provide in its budget. It did not produce the amount of revenue expected, and it did not bear the business. If the war had not come we should soon have faced the necessity for some new tariff legislation.

With the war came, and with it such gigantic business everywhere at once began to show the effects. Although at first, and for long, only an observer of the struggle, we had our troubles, and a leading one was the inadequate amount of revenue.

The war has been in progress bordering on three years. The area of action has broadened. We have been drawn in. Business embarrassments have multiplied. As a result there are new angles to the tariff question, and some new ideas as to old angles. When the war ends there will be tariff revisions all over Europe, and of course we shall have to take them into account.

Business Comes First. This government is to borrow money as it never did before, and to levy taxes such as the people never before dreamed of. Bonds can be bought and sales paid out of the proceeds of productive industry. Therefore it is important, nay, necessary, to keep production at the highest point possible.

It will of course have to be heavily taxed, but that fact makes it all the more imperative that it be fairly taxed. "Business as usual" may be a difficult ideal. But it is one that, in these trying times, it is worth while to strive for. There will be much selfishness here of the efforts to avoid taxation. In that, of course, we have no sympathy.

No Time to Mark Up Schedules. No one would object to tariff increases that could justify themselves at the treasury. At a time like this, the "free trade table" might well be abandoned, and duties levied on tea and coffee that would produce a tidy sum. Rates on other imported wares might be raised—provided always that the benefit goes to the United States government, not to some trust.

Need for Definite System. There should be a definite taxation system which will be understood by the whole country, with such exemptions as will enable individuals to buy the necessities of life, and firms and corporations to maintain themselves and make a fair return on investment.

Mistake to Centralize Power. A redistribution of power in the cabinet and an increase in the number of cabinet officers may very well go with the large increase in general powers which congress will bestow on the executive branch of the government. Even as energetic and competent an official as Lord Kitchener broke down when he tried to look after the supplies, provisions, recruiting and campaigning of the British army.

The mistake made in overworking Kitchener was one of the mistakes against which England has warned the United States, and no similar mistake should be made here.

Unscientific Legislation. The 10 per cent tariff increase in the tax bill effects only the articles on the free list. Thus, the increase applies to all articles now entering the ports of the United States free of duty, even including those free-listed in protective tariff measures. The method by which this new source of revenue is sought to be developed is wholly unscientific, as it fails to recognize that one series of duties has a very important relation to other series and that there can be no disentanglement.

There is nothing in such a productive. There is nothing in the money that can possibly be needed by the government. The tax burden can be distributed in such a way that it can be borne without the slightest handicap to anyone, without stifling any industry or discouraging initiative.

We ought to report that further committee of investigation have reported Mr. Roosevelt's all-encompassing plan from 180,000 to 871,000,000. Something like Mr. Bryan's vaunting "million springs."
